

with congenital CMV.


When I learned it was preventable and could have been treated if discovered during my pregnancy, I was shocked.



One in two hundred babies are born with congenital CMV each year. Yet, ninety-one percent of women have never heard of CMV. What is cytomegal-ovirus anyways...

"CMV is a member of the herpes virus family. Coming into contact with the CMV virus is a common occurrence and is typically harmless to the general population. A CMV infection causes cold-like symptoms, such as a sore throat, fever, fatigue and swollen glands". The CMV virus is most dangerous if you have a CMV infection for the first time while pregnant. CMV can cause severe disease in babies who were infected with CMV before birth (referred to as congenital CMV infection). CMV is spread by contact. It is most common in children under five, when kids are sharing toys, putting things in their mouth, going to the bathroom and not washing their hands, etc. Once you have had CMV it stays in your body forever. Coming into contact with urine or saliva of young children makes you high risk for being exposed to CMV. Pregnant

Resources for Spanish speaking families and their children

At Illinois Hands & Voices, we strive to support parents and families of children who are deaf and hard of hearing. One of the many ways we support these families is by educating them on different topics related to hearing loss. After the initial diagnosis and through-out the years, parents will need to make informed decisions when it comes to their child's hearing options, hearing devices, communication modes, schooling, etc. Parents are initially overwhelmed with the diagnosis, and this is when we need to support them the most. In the next days, weeks, months, and years, they will make the most important choices that will help their child reach his/her maximum potential in his/her future. To make these important decisions parents need to be well informed, and this is our main goal. We want to help them become experts in the on their child's disability. This way, when they attend clinical appointments they will understand: the terminology, what the test results mean, and what the recommendations are. They can ask questions to clear their doubts and help them feel confident with the decisions they are about to make. We want to empower parents with unbiased information and knowledge, so they can decide what is best for their child and their family.

But how can we provide this support to Spanish speaking families that might experience language barriers? Here at IL Hands & Voices there are no barriers. We support Spanish speaking families the same way we support our English-speaking families. We provide them with educational materials, answer questions, and connect them with other parents, professionals and centers around the state. We do all of this in written and spoken Spanish. We have a Spanish committee dedicated to support these families. We have Spanish speaking trained Parent Guides through our Guide By Your Side Program (a free support for families) and professionals on the board who are native Spanish speakers.

In recent years, we have done more than ever before for our Spanish families. We have connected with different Spanish speaking professionals across the country, who have graciously shared their knowledge with our families. In turn, we have created a video library of short lectures and mini seminars in Spanish. We are very



mothers, daycare workers, nurses ect who are pregnant or planning to become pregnant should

practice standard hygiene precautions. You should always wash your hands after changing

diapers, coming into contact with children's toys, feeding, or wiping mouth or noses.

My son, Axel, was born with congenital CMV. During my pregnancy I had become sick. I called

my doctor who then called me in a prescription for a cough syrup and told me that he would see

me at my next appointment. By that time, I had felt better, and no one ever followed up on my "cold". Shortly after, I was told that Axel had a heart condition that would require open heart surgery at birth. He then stopped growing and was significantly less active. At 37 weeks, I was



induced. Axel was whisked away to start the necessary steps to prepare for heart surgery. A few hours had passed and the doctor came to my room to tell me that Axel's blood work came back indicating he had some type of infection but they weren't sure exactly what. The team did not want to open up his heart and expose his heart to the infection. Heart surgery was then on hold. The next day they discovered Axel was born with congenital CMV infection. As they began to treat the CMV, Axel's heart returned to normal size, it was no longer swollen. His heart was working so hard to fight off the infection in utero making it look like he had coarctation of the aorta. Although I was relieved my baby no longer needed heart surgery, my heart was heavy when I was told that congenital CMV was not going to be the only diagnosis we had to deal with. The diagnosis' that would come consequently due to the CMV were significant. I was told that my son would be severely developmentally delayed and received other diagnosis; including, bilateral profound sensorineural hearing loss, optic nerve hypoplasia, spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy, hyperekplexia, polymicrogyria, calcifications on the brain, and malformation of the brain, among a few other diagnosis'. There is no amount of preparation you can do during your pregnancy to prepare yourself for the moment the doctors confirm a disability your newborn has. I was devastated, but I was also angry too. I was angered when I learned all of

these things were preventable but no one told me. I was even more angered when I learned



there was treatment available for CMV if you find out you have CMV during your pregnancy.

From that moment forward, our family dedicated ourselves to raising awareness and being apart

of the movement to stop CMV. Last year, we held a CMV Awareness fundraiser in our

hometown. We were able to donate \$5,300 to the National CMV Foundation. I have also started

a blog on Facebook called, "Axel's Journey With CMV" I later became a board member for IL Hands & Voices, CMV is the leading cause of non genetic hearing loss. Hands & Voices has given me an opportunity to share education on CMV throughout the deaf and hard of hearing community.

The story doesn't end here, we will never stop fighting for CMV education, awareness, and prevention. You can also be apart of the movement to stop CMV. For more information, resources, or opportunities to help you can visit www.nationalCMV.org.

Care Coordinators tailor services to each family's needs. Our support may include:

- assistance accessing free diagnostic testing;
- finding specialized medical care;
- help utilizing insurance;

A Social Experience for Families of Children with Hearing Loss



Mentors & Families Working Together

The Connections Program (CP) at Chicago Hearing Society (CHS) is an on-going, family-centered support program that links adults who are Deaf, DeafBlind or Hard of Hearing (D/DB/HH), called Mentors, with families who have children who are D/DB/HH, providing an array of support services. The CP is part of statewide initiative to reach out to families who are hearing and have a child who is D/DB/HH between birth to 22 years old. Research shows a child's natural ability to develop language is strongest within the first years of life and family members are their primary source of language. Through this connection, Mentors provide the entire family with the support, perspective, advocacy, community resources and options necessary for parents to help their D/DB/HH children achieve their full potential in both the hearing and leaf worlds.

How It Works

Parents submit an application to be a part of the **CP**. The **CP** coordinator works directly with the family to arrange mentor services. Mentors then visit families, typically two hours per week, in their homes where their child is most comfortable and eager to learn. They are selected to represent the **CP** for the ease of their communication style with family members and for their comfortable approach with children.

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



What do children do? Each morning the children go to classrooms overseen by experienced teachers of chil-dren who are deaf or hard of hearing. Children are given hearing, vision, psychological, speech, language and edu-cational evaluations. Children will also have the chance to play with other children who have a hearing loss.

What do parents do? Parents attend daily lectures by experts in the field to learn about raising a child with hearing loss. They also meet in small groups to discuss specific concerns and connect with other caregivers. Parents meet with professional staff to review the evaluations for their child. They are also provided with the opportunity to learn about various communication modes used with deaf or hard of hearing individuals.




