


#### We're All in This Together

On a recent family vacation, we found ourselves at an outdoor concert filled with fellow vacationers. While my son, Noah, played in the sand with another boy, I noticed a man looking at him which is not uncommon given that my son wears cochlear implants. I just assumed it would be another conversation of, "Does he have seizures?" or "What are those things on his head?'; the kinds of questions we usually get asked by people who are curious. Instead, the man approached me and asked me where my son had his cochlear implant sur-



gery. I have to admit I was a bit surprised that he knew what they were and figured he worked in the field of audiology. As we talked more, I learned that he knew exactly what the implants were because he has a three-year-old son who wears BAHA's. Not long after we starting chatting, the man's wife and son joined us and we continued to engage like long-lost friends sharing stories about the challenges and successes we have all faced as parents of children

who have a hearing loss. It was a beautiful moment and the friends we were with commented on what a wonderful thing it was to find people who share a special connection and bond. They were exactly right. It's not every day that we encounter other children or adults who have hearing loss. But when we do, it is the perfect opportunity to show Noah that he is not alone. At the end of our vacation, standing at the luggage carousel waiting for our suitcases at Chicago O'Hare airport we had another encounter with a mom who has a thirteen-year-old son who also wears bilateral cochlear implants. She came over and introduced herself to us and told us that she lives in DC but was in Chicago for business and had to come over and say hello after



seeing Noah. She talked to Noah and showed him pictures of her son who plays sports and is in band. Again, as we stood chatting for a few minutes, it felt like we were old friends who were just catching up on life and what our kids have been up to. I cherish these moments with other families, and I loved that Noah could see that a kiddo just like him never let his hearing loss get in the way of the things he wanted to do. While it may seem like we are alone at times and that nobody really understands what it is like living the day to day life of a parent who has a child with hearing loss, or any disability for that matter, it is so important to remind each other that we are not walking this path alone. We have each other to lean on and talk to, whether it is a family you met through a Hands & Voices event or the stranger you met at the luggage carousel at the airport, there is support out there. Making these connections is a bonus part of the journey. We are all in this together and we can learn so much from each other as we navigate our own individual paths.



#### Hearing Aid Legislation in IL

Hunter Martin, 10 years old, is a 5th grader at Sangamon Valley Intermediate School in Illiopolis, Illinois. Hunter was identified with hearing loss when he was born and received hearing aids when he was 3 months old. Hunter's mother, Ramona Martin, began talking with legislators in 2012 regarding the need for mandated insurance coverage for hearing aids. As Hunter got older and saw the fight that his mother was facing to get legislators support, he asked if he could go with her to explain the need for hearing aids. He stated that "maybe they will listen to me since I have to deal with having hearing aids everyday." Hunter was asked to come speak before the Senate Insurance committee during the Spring 2017 session. The



bill did not get voted on that session. During the 2018 spring session, a new bill was introduced, HB4516 by Representative Laura Fine. Hunter was asked to speak before the House Insurance committee on 2-27-18 and

on 5-23-18.

was given the bill on 6-29-18 and he had 60 days

to adopt or veto the bill.

tin was present with the Governor on August 22, 2018 when Governor Rauner signed HB4516 into law! The Governor shook Hunters hand and stated, "You are one of the youngest, most effective lobbyists in Illinois history"! Hunter replied "Wow." Hunter has thought outside the box on this lobbying process. He made YouTube videos for the Governor, explaining why he feels hearing aids should be covered; he called together other children with hearing aids from Central Illinois to create a video. Hunter is a very bright, young man with a great future ahead of him. He reports that his life goals after high school are to go to college, join the military, become a Senator or Representative of Illinois and then become the President of the United States. I truly believe that Hunter can do any and

all of these things! We cannot be more proud of him.

## How WE HELP

The University of Illinois at Chicago - Division of Specialized Care for Children offers free care coordination for families of children with special health care needs in Illinois.

Care Coordinators tailor services to each family's needs. Our support may include:

- assistance accessing free diagnostic testing;
- finding specialized medical care;
- help utilizing insurance;
- finding resources and information;
- developing a plan of care;
- communicating with doctors, specialists, and schools; and
- preparing for transition.

Free care coordination is available if your child has, or is suspected of having, a treatable chronic condition in one of the following categories:

- Cardiac Impairments
- O Cystic Fibrosis
- Eye Impairments (Cataract, Glaucoma, Strabismus)



It is with great sadness to report the loss of Blackhawks icon, Stan Mikita. Stan was one of the greatest supporters of Deaf and Hard of Hearing children and their families. Stan, with the late Irv Tiahnybik, founded the America Hearing Impaired Hockey Association (AHIHA) and the Stan Mikita Hockey School in 1973. He dedicated his time and talent to the camp and recruited current and former NHL players to help coach and run the school. He secured sponsors to fund the program which allowed each player to attend the weeklong school for free. Since 1973, thousands of athletes who are Deaf and Hard of Hearing have attended the annual AHIHA - Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing.

Guide By Your Side is the result of a collaborative effort between the following: IL Hands & Voices and the IL Early Hearing Detection & Intervention (EHDI) Program.



AHIHA is not just a place where players learn to improve their game. It is also a place where life-long friend-ships are formed both for the players and their families. Similar to the Hands and Voices philosophy, families and children interact whether they use spoken language or American Sign Language and regardless of whether they use a hearing aid, cochlear implant, or no equipment at all.

My son, Eli has participated in AHIHA for the last 8 years. We are fortunate that it is held in Illinois. Families travel from as far away as Alaska! While it takes place only about 45 minutes from our home, we still choose to stay at the hotel facility so that we can have a true and full AHIHA experience. It is an event that we look forward to all year. It is a place where Eli can play with Deaf and Hard of Hearing friends from all across the country who share common life experiences. It is a place where we, as parents, can commiserate about the challenges and triumphs we face when raising a child with hearing loss. It is also a place where parents can just have FUN at the many social events that are held during the week.

We are beyond grateful to Stan Mikita for establishing AHIHA. He will be sorely missed but I know his inspiration will allow today's Deaf and Hard of Hearing players, as well as future generations, to pursue their dreams and to achieve success both on and off the ice.
